2. GENERAL INFORMATION ABOUT EUSA

The European University Sports Association (EUSA) is an umbrella organization that comprises National University Sports Associations (NUSA) from 47 European countries, providing sporting activities, educational events, and expertise in policy making and programming. The organization is well known within the sector as a safe and strong voice for university sports in Europe, promoting fair play values and supporting their membership by partnering with European Sports Federations and lobbying within the European Union, the Council of Europe, and other institutions for funding to improve the provision of sport. EUSA is a proud and active associated member of the International University Sports Federation (FISU), strategically cooperating also with other Continental University Sports Federations (CUSF), as well as key governing bodies and organisations active in the field of sport, education, and youth.

Since its founding in 1999, EUSA has organised 16 seasons of the European Universities Championships, attracting student-athletes to 204 university competitions held across Europe. In five previous editions of the European Universities Games, around 19.500 student- athletes from across Europe have participated in the different sporting competitions organised during these multi-sports events.

Through its Institute, EUSA also engages in several social responsibility projects and initiatives on various topics, including Anti-Doping, Dual Career, Equal Opportunities and Inclusion, Good Governance, Mobility, Safeguarding, Skills Development, Sustainability, and Volunteering. Many of the projects are supported by the European Union.



2.1 EUSA EC, Commissions and Office

Highest body is the General Assembly, composed of representatives of the member associations, electing the Executive Committee. Its members are responsible for the administration and running of EUSA and the execution of main directives taken by the Assembly.

The EUSA Executive Committee is led by the President, Adam Roczek, 1st Vice President, four Vice-Presidents, Treasurer and Secretary General.

Various EUSA commissions are in place to provide assistance and guidance to the many different activities EUSA is involved in. These commissions include the Technical Commission, Control Commission, Education Commission, Inclusion and Diversity Commission, Medical Commission, Student Commission, Branding and Marketing Council and also other working bodies

EUSA's headquarters is located in **Ljubljana**, **Slovenia**, where a dedicated team of 12 staff members plus 4 volunteers/interns work together to manage daily operations and oversee international activities. As part of the European University Sports Association (EUSA), they play a vital role in supporting the development and promotion of university sports across Europe, ensuring smooth coordination of events, effective communication, and strong collaboration among member organizations.

3. GENERAL INFORMATION ABOUT THE HOST

3.1 About Host Country

Hungary is located in the heart of Europe, in the basin of the Carpathian Mountains. With a population of nearly ten million, it counts as a medium-sized Member State of the European Union. Its capital is Budapest, which is the country's largest city and also its most visited tourist destination.

The country is a member of NATO, OECD and the United Nations, a part of the Schengen area, which allows citizens to travel between countries in the Schengen area without controls.

Hungary is a country rich in natural treasures. One of the world's largest thermal water reserves, the largest thermal lake (Lake Hévíz), the largest body of water in Central Europe (Lake Balaton), as well as the largest grassy steppes of Central Europe (Hortobágy) are all located here. The two major rivers crossing the country, the Danube and the Tisza, play determining roles in the hydrography of Hungary. The highest point of Hungary, Mount Kékes (1,014 m), a place of therapeutic climate and a popular tourist destination, can be found in the Mátra Mountains in north-eastern Hungary.

The area of the country is 93,025 sq.km, with forests covering twenty percent. Hungary's wildlife is one of the richest in Europe. The natural treasures are preserved in 10 national parks, 39 protected landscapes, 174 nature preservation areas and 103 natural monuments.

Hungary is the 11th most popular tourist destination in Europe. Particularly popular areas within the country include Budapest, Lake Balaton and the Danube Bend, but the Tokaj wine region, the Mátra and Bükk Mountains, Debrecen and Hortobágy, as well as Sopron and the Fertő Lake area are also popular.

The country hosts numerous art and music festivals, touristic and sporting events each year

Throughout history, Hungary has always made significant contributions to the global treasures of culture, in the areas of arts, music, literature, sports and sciences. There is a multitude of natural landscapes of exceptional beauty, historic fortifications, and protected monuments of diverse architectural styles in the country.

Hungarian folk music is famous around the world, and has inspired major composers such as Johannes Brahms, Franz Liszt, Béla Bartók and Zoltán Kodály. Gastronomy is a noteworthy part of Hungarian culture, which is shown, in addition to the popularity of national dishes, by the wide range of gastronomy festivals. Thanks to the unmatched diversity of Hungarian wine regions, such Hungarian wines have become world famous as the "Tokay aszú", the "bikavér" (bull's blood) of Eger, or the "szürkebarát" (grey monk) of Badacsony.









3.2 About Budapest

The current population of Hungary's capital, Budapest, situated in the heart of Europe is 1.7 million

The territory of Budapest is 525 km2. The city of Budapest is one of the most romantic and most entertaining capitals of the world. It is often referred to as the "Paris of the East". Budapest is youthful and dynamic where modern and traditional go hand in hand in harmony. The city is divided by the winding River Danube which is spanned by a number of splendid bridges. The city's climate is continental and is free from extreme weather conditions.

Budapest is a wonderful city where tradition meets innovation, and history is combined with youthful and vibrant life to provide visitors with an experience they never forget. Start your tour at the Parliament and Kossuth tér. The building is impressive in itself, inside and out, while it also serves as the venue for much-beloved traditional ceremonies.

The next must-see spot is the expanse that is Hősök tere (Heroes' Square), a tribute to the chieftains who settled the region that would later become Hungary. There are several museums in the immediate vicinity of the square, while the City Park is just a stone's throw away.

Another box to tick if you only have time for a one-day tour is the Castle District. The Castle is home to some of the most iconic locations in Budapest, such as the Fisherman's Bastion and Matthias Church, which both offer a magnificent view of the whole city.

At the city centre there are religious buildings that are an integral part of both the past and present of Budapest. The most important of these buildings are the monumental Saint Stephen's Basilica, with its tower that gives you a spectacular view of the whole town, and the Dohány utca Synagogue, which is the largest synagogue in Europe.

When it comes to talking about bridges in Budapest, the first one everyone thinks of is the Chain Bridge (Lánchíd), which had the most influential history (it was the first permanent crossing), while the Liberty Bridge (Szabadság híd) spans the river at a location that is among the spots most frequently visited by tourists.

Spas in Budapest range from the laid-back Turkish design of the Király Thermal Bath, through the eclectic beauty of the Rudas Thermal Bath, not to mention the Lukács Thermal Bath, which is renowned for its waters' miraculous healing powers, to the 'star' attractions, the Gellért Thermal Bath and Széchenyi Thermal Bath.















3.3 About The Hungarian University of Sports Science

The Hungarian University of Sports Science (TF) has been actively shaping the national sports scene and the future of physical education since 1925. The institution was founded on the initiative of Culture Minister Kuno Klebelsberg, under the name Royal Hungarian College of Physical Education. His dedication made it possible for Hungarian sports science and physical education to advance to a new level. The very first academic year (starting in November 1925) began with great momentum, along with the founding of the college's sports club, the predecessor of today's TFSE.

Since then, TF has continuously developed. With its expanding programmes, research activities and international partnerships, the university has long been one of Europe's leading institutions in sports science. In 1975, it was granted university status, and since 1989, it has officially operated as a university. Since 2022, as a foundation-based university, it has been known as the Hungarian University of Sports Science.

Today, TF offers programs at all levels — BSc, MSc, and PhD — covering the full spectrum of sports science. In addition to teacher training in physical education, specialized coaching, sports management, human kinesiology, and recreation programmes, students have the opportunity to develop across a wide range of sports disciplines and scientific fields. The university maintains close ties with national and international sports organizations and actively contributes to the advancement of sports science.

The university is proud of the fact that 151 Olympic champions have earned their degrees at TF so far, and that number is still growing! The TFSE sports club, host of the European Universities Volleyball Championship 2025, continues to compete actively on both domestic and international stages.

Located in the heart of Budapest's 12th district, our campus offers state-of-the-art sports facilities and research institutes to its students. TF remains a key centre for sport, physical education, and sports science both in Hungary and internationally.







3.4 University Sport in the Host Country

MEFS, as a University Sports Federation was founded in 1907, the first one in Europe and the second one at word level. Over the decades, it has taken many organisational forms, it has been holding its current name since September 1991. Its members are not only civil sport organisations (clubs), but also (public) higher education institutions (universities, colleges). A total number of 37 higher education institutions and 35 university sports clubs are members of MEFS.

Further to that 37 university sports offices (at national level) also support MEFS as its key stakeholders. 205.000 students - 98.9% of whom have active student status in a MEFS member institution - as well as 40.000 teachers, researchers and staff are linked directly to MEFS.

The most important cooperating partners of the Hungarian University Sports Federation are the national sport federations, the governmental bodies responsible for sport and higher education, the Hungarian Olympic Committee (MOB), the Hungarian Rector's Conference (MRK), and the National Conference of Student Self-Governments (HÖOK).

For the first time in its history, MEFS was incorporated into the 2004 Act on Sport (issued on 1 st January 2017). By this act MEFS holds an exclusive status of organising the National / Hungarian student-athletes' participation at International University Sports Federation (FISU) and the European University Sports Association (EUSA) events, and the Hungarian University and College National Championships (MEFOB).

The Act also ensures the exclusive right for MEFS to organise and host international university sport events in Hungary. Further to these legally guaranteed rights and duties, MEFS also supports elite athletes entering higher education through the introduction and maintaining of a dual career system and the status of elite university athlete at national level. MEFS gives priority to university recreational sports to ensure that students (typically aged between 18-28) become healthy Hungarian intellectuals through regular weekly sporting activities.

MEFS is currently active in several areas, with a special focus on the following three fields: national and international competitive sport, recreational sport, and sport for people with disabilities. In cooperation with higher educational institutions, sports clubs, and the respective national sport federation, MEFS organises the Hungarian University and College National Championships (MEFOB) in 40-45 sports each year. The university national championships also promote sports among students, strengthen the institutional identity and facilitate the selection of athletes for FISU and EUSA competitions. In accordance with the rules applied at international university sport level, the competitions are open to athletes who hold an existing student's status at the time of the competition or who graduated from a higher education institution in the year preceding the competition at the earliest. For the third year in a row, MEFS has organised several Hungarian university championships using the community-building power of sport within the framework of the biggest festival of university sport, MEFOB FESZT, where students compete in 10-14 sports over four days. At the end of the competition days a series of interactive activities and concerts are also organised. Year by year, MEFOB FESZT is hosted by different universities, guaranteeing a solid prestigious status to the organiser.

Hungarian university teams are regular participants in FISU and EUSA sporting events. Since 2012, as part of the closer cooperation between MEFS and universities, there have been more and more Hungarian student-athletes entering to various EUSA events (EUG and EUC). This permanent increase in the number of participants as well as in the number of sports, reflects the dedication of MEFS towards the closer cooperation with EUSA.



HUNGARIAN UNIVERSITY SPORTS FEDERATION







Until now, our country has hosted three World University Games, fourteen World University Championships (WUC) and six European Universities Championships (EUC), and one European Universites Games (2024). The 2016 WUC in Orienteering (held in Miskolc) was awarded as the best organised WUC event of the year. The vision of MEFS is to create a healthier society based on both the success of talented university student-athletes and the healthy lifestyle of future intellectuals. MEFS contributes to the healthier life of university/college students by promoting the encouragement and organisation of regular physical activity. The biggest leisure sports event organised by MEFS is the International Day of University Sport (IDUS), a day of sport organised by MEFS partner institutions, where more than 180000 students have the opportunity to choose from over 160 sports in 35 institutions. In addition, every year, MEFS supports the Carpathian Basin University Cup, which was held for the 15 th time this year and was attended by 1900 athletes from 110 teams from 5 countries and 50 universities. For more than ten years, MEFS has also given priority to the National Tourism Meeting of University and College Students (EFOTT), where nearly 30 university-related sports can be tried out in an informal setting in the SportUniverse area, thus contributing to the promotion of recreational sports in higher education during the summer festival.

3.5 Useful Information



Immigration and custom procedures

From December 21, 2007 Hungary is a member of the Schengen Area, and applies the Schengen legislation in full. Significant changes subsequent to Hungary's Schengen-membership are that visas and residence permits issued by one of the Schengen States are valid also for Hungary, visas issued by Hungarian representations abroad and residence permits issued by Hungarian national authorities are also valid for the entire Schengen Area.



Electricity

Standard voltage in Hungary is European standard 220-240 V. Electrical plugs are "Type F" and "Type C".



Currency

Hungarian forint (HUF) has been the local currency in Hungary since August 1946. Banknotes come in denominations of 500, 1000, 2000, 5000, 10,000 and 20,000. Six different coins are in use: 5, 10, 20, 50, 100 and 200 forint coins. For the current exchange rates please visit the Hungarian National Bank's website: https://www.mnb.hu/web/en.



Credit Cards

Visa and MasterCard are the most widely accepted credit cards in Hungary. Using a card at a payment is accepted almost everywhere, although small businesses may not accept credit cards. Using an ATM in Hungary is safe in most cases.



Climate

Hungary has a typical continental climate with hot, dry summers and mildly cold winters. July is one of the favourite times of the year to visit Hungary. Although the hottest month is July, with possible rainfalls occasionally. The intensity of UV-B radiation is strong, in the range of 5 to 7, and sometimes even higher.



Sports

184 gold, 158 silver, 183 bronze Olympic medals prove that Hungary is indeed a sports nation. Several major international sport events have been organised in Hungary such as FINA World Aquatics Championships, UEFA EURO2020, EHF EURO2022 or World Athletics Championships 2023, and European Universities Games 2024



Government

Parliamentary republic with a multi-party system. The President of Hungary serves as the head of state, while the Prime Minister is the head of government. The Parliament of Hungary is the country's legislative body.



Driving

Like elsewhere in mainland Europe, you must drive on the right side of the road.



Medicines

Those taking medication on a regular basis may bring medicines in the quantities prescribed by their physicians, in accordance with the length of their travels.



Smoking

It is not allowed to smoke in public transport, pubs, bars, restaurants and in national institutions. It is forbidden to smoke in a 5-meter radius from the entrance of primary schools, secondary schools, playgrounds, bus stops, hospitals, or child welfare institutions. Smoking is prohibited during sporting events as well!



Water quality

Tap water is drinkable and safe for everyday usage.

4.3 Sustainability, Innovation & Legacy

One of the biggest developments in the history of the HUSS is the Smart Campus Project, planned to be finished by 2025. Under the framework of this project all facilities are becoming remote-controlled smart buildings where students and athletes are able or soon will be able to use their cards to access the campus and make purchases. Access of all services is also based on the authorization provided by these cards. The event would benefit from the impact of the project through its cashless payment method and other smart digital solutions.

As a university specialised for sports, the HUSS does not need to convince its students about the importance of sport and healthy life but its aim is to educate them to live an environmentally conscious lifestyle too. According to this principle, the event would be completely plastic-free.



4.4 Legacy

The Hungarian government gave volleyball a big opportunity in 2017 to join soccer, handball, basketball, ice-hockey and water polo as a selected team sport. These six sports have better financial opportunities through a new tax credit system. Since then, we are working with the federation on making university volleyball more popular in Hungary. We are entitled to make more effort until the event and hopefully with this great opportunity hosting an international event it will be a reachable goal to organize a whole season long national university championship with at least 10+10 teams. This would be a great long-term achievement to reach with the help of the event.

We also hope that the participants will take home their impressions about the country, city and university and come back later as tourists or come to join the international courses of the HUSS in Hungary or online.

4.5 Volunteers Program

The smooth running of the eight-day tournament will be supported by more than 150 dedicated volunteers. Their efforts are coordinated by the Volunteer and Sustainability Office of the Hungarian University of Sports Science (HUSS), led by Dr. Szilvia Perényi. This office plays a key role in organizing and overseeing the volunteer program to ensure the success of the event.

Volunteers will be active across ten functional areas, including competition management, transport and transfers, ceremonies, side events, marketing, team assistance, and accreditation.

The volunteer team is impressively diverse, with participants ranging from high school students to retirees – one of whom is 88 years old and a regular contributor at HUSS-coordinated sporting events. In total, volunteers from 20 different countries will take part in delivering the European Universities Volleyball Championship.





4.6 Ceremonies

4.6.1 Opening Ceremony

The opening ceremony of the EUC Volleyball 2025 will take place on Sunday, 27 July at 18:00 in the Koltai Jenő Sport Centre. All participating teams are invited to attend the opening ceremony. To participate in the procession, teams will assemble at the entrance of the Sport Centre (side of the stadium) from 16:45. There, OC staff and volunteers will be waiting for them with exciting activities and information. A Fun Zone will be set up in front of the Sport Centre to entertain participants until the official opening.

- Participants are arranged in columns in the order of their arrival, coordinated by volunteers. The march will be led by EUC
 Volleyball 2025 flag bearer volunteers. The entire team must be represented at the march.
- Once the teams have entered, they will take their designated seats in the auditorium, guided by our volunteers, from where
 they can watch the opening ceremony from a seated position. The dress code for the teams participating in the entry ceremony will be the university uniform (team jersey or t-shirt).
- During the official ceremony, there will be speeches and cultural entertainment. Make sure to bring your waterbottle with
 you that you can refill onsite.
- Please bring your accreditation card with you when entering the Sport Centre.
- EUC Volleyball 2025 partners, competition staff, EUSA Office and VIP guests will be seated in the auditorium during the opening ceremony.
- Gathering in front of the dormitory building at 4:00 PM, from where dedicated buses will take participants to the opening ceremony venue.
- Return travel will take place after dinner following the opening ceremony, using public transportation. Departure times of bus line 139 from the nearby stop: 20:04, 20:19, 20:34, 20:49, 21:00, 21:05, 21:20, 21:30, 21:35, 21:55. The 21:00 and 21:30 buses will arrive at the stop empty (with available seating).
- During the return trip, team escort volunteers and the organizers will assist with directions. The distance is 3 bus stops (about 10 minutes).
- More information will be available at the General Technical Meeting.



4.6.2 Closing ceremony

- The closing ceremony of EUC Budapest 2025 will be held on Sunday, 3 August, immediately after the conclusion of the awards ceremony at the Koltai Jenő Sport Centre. All teams are encouraged to stay and participate in this final event of the championship.
- The ceremony will include a brief farewell address and celebratory program to mark the end of the competition. Participants will be seated in the auditorium following the awards presentation.
- The closing ceremony aims to celebrate the spirit of fair play, unity, and sportsmanship that defined the event. Accreditation cards are required for entry, and water will be available on site.
- Further details will be provided at the General Technical Meeting.

4.6.3 Award ceremonies

- The awards ceremony of EUC Budapest 2025 will take place on Sunday, 3 August, immediately following the final match at the
 Koltai Jenő Sport Centre. Medals and trophies will be presented in the following order: first the women's competition, followed by
 the men's competition.
- All awarded teams and individual athletes must attend the ceremony in their university uniforms (team jersey or t-shirt). Volunteers
 will guide medal-winning teams to the designated staging area after their final match to prepare for the awards presentation.

Individual Awards

- Most Valuable Player (MVP)

- The Fair Play Award will be selected based on nominations by the SCAC and CTC, considering the conduct of teams throughout the tournament.
- The Most Valuable Player Award will be determined by daily coach nominations (one per team per game) and CTC member votes, with nominations from final round matches (semifinals, bronze match, and final) counting double. In the event of a tie, the player from the higher-ranked team will be awarded MVP.
- The Top Scorer Award will be based on official scoring statistics collected during the tournament and published daily in the EUSA results.
- Competitors are not allowed to place national/regional flags or symbols of their country/region, culture or religion on the podium. The winners will be expected to wear the uniform of the opening ceremony at the award ceremony. They may, however, attend the official ceremony in their sports uniform if the ceremony takes place immediately after the competition. Athletes must remove their caps when receiving their medals and keep them on during the ceremony (i.e. the playing of the EUSA anthem and the raising of the flags).



4.9 ANTI-DOPING

Doping is not a guarantee of success in sport. In fact, its effect is usually the opposite. A lot of elite sportsmen and sportswomen who did doping got caught. As a result, they lost pride and were banned for at least 2 years from participating in a sport they loved and lived for. An even bigger problem of doping are the effects on the body.

In elite sports, doping is defined as a violation of one or more anti-doping rules:

- 1. Presence of a prohibited substance in an athlete's sample
- 2. Use or attempted use of a prohibited substance or method
- 3. Refusing to submit sample collection after being notified
- 4. Failure to file athlete whereabouts information & missed tests
- 5. Tampering with any part of the doping control process
- 6. Possession of a prohibited substance or method
- 7. Trafficking a prohibited substance or method
- 8. Administering or attempting to administer a prohibited substance or method to an athlete


You can find the list of prohibited substances and methods on the internet, as it is updated every year by the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA) and it's valid for every sport.

EUSA is active in Anti-Doping promotion, and has been a partner in the European Anti-Doping Initiative (EADIn) and Match point, supporting European-wide Anti-Doping mentality in the youth sector by establishing a moral tenor towards concepts such as Fair-play, sensitizing and raising awareness on all levels of the complex social environment surrounding the doping problematic and implementing strategies to motivate young people to pass on the message and create a strong multiplying effect. Also, the International University Sport Federation (FISU) has been actively promoting sports without drugs, also on university sport level.

EUSA is currently not enforcing doping tests at our events. In accordance with the national legislation of the host countries, however, doping controls may be implemented by the National Anti-Doping Agencies. If such doping tests are executed, the WADA rules and regulations are applicable to all athletes. Please remember that testing can be conducted in-competition and out-of-competition. If you are identified in a Registered Testing Pool (RTP), you must provide current and accurate whereabouts information.

Fair play is present in sports as the unwritten rule, a moral value that represents the real essence of sport. Since 2007, EUSA has honoured outstanding acts of fair play with the Enno Harms Fair Play Award, named after the first EUSA President and a strong advocate for fair play. At each event, organisers, delegates, and participants commit to upholding fair play, with the oath of respect and integrity declared during the opening ceremonies.

The prestigious annual EUSA Enno Harms Fair Play Award is awarded to athletes demonstrating fair play during the matches, following the rules, and pursuing a "clean" game, and is awarded with a fair play recognition already during the event. EUSA Executive Committee members discuss the proposals received from all sporting events governed by EUSA in that year and select the team or individual to receive the Enno Harms Fair Play award, which is formally handed to them at a special occasion, usually at the EUSA Gala.

Fair play will remain a key focus at the European Universities Championships 2025.

Guided by EUSA's principles and the Olympic spirit, our events promote respect, equality, and non-discrimination, contributing to a more inclusive and peaceful society through sport.

5. SERVICE INFORMATION

5.1 Transportation

5.1.1 Arrivals

The official arrival day for the competition is July 26^{th} . The Organizing Committee can only provide transfer services for participating teams on this day, using dedicated buses.

The official arrival points are as follows:

- Liszt Ferenc International Airport
- O Nyugati Railway Station, Déli Railway Station, Keleti Railway Station
- Népliget Bus Terminal, Kelenföld Bus Terminal



Please note that <u>Nyugati Railway Station</u> will be <u>CLOSED</u> to train traffic until <u>JULY 27</u>. Passengers planning to travel via this route will need to disembark at an earlier station.

Teams arriving by their own bus or vans can park at the campus of the Hungarian University of Sports Science. Arrival address: 1123 Budapest, Alkotás utca 42-48.

Teams are kindly asked to plan their travel so that they arrive on July 26th at one of the above locations.

5.1.2 Transportation during the competition

The Organizing Committee will provide all participants a public transport pass, valid for the entire duration of the competition. All athletes, team officials, referees will be able to get to the competition venues, the catering centre and their accommodations using public transportation. Budapest's public transport network is highly extensive: there are 4 metro lines, trams, trolleybuses, buses and suburban railways. The night transport system of the city is also active.

5.1.2 Departures

The departure day of the tournament is August 4th. Organizers will provide dedicated transfers from all accommodations to the departure points as well as for arrivals.

We ask all delegations to submit their travel plans accurately in order to organize a smooth transfer service, both for arrivals and departures!

5.2 Medical services

According to the medical assistance needed in the competition, the OC will provide services to all participants in the event, with the presence of medical doctors and ambulances at all sport venues, and the accommodation site during the entire time of the EUC.

However, all delegation is responsible for the health and medical insurance of all their athletes and team officials!

5.3 Security Services

- All competition venues will be secured by official security personnel. Participating teams will be provided with lockable locker rooms
 for the duration of their games, but everyone should be careful with their personal valuables.
- 24-hour reception service will be available at the main building of the university as well as the accommodation of the athletes and team officials.
- Although Budapest is a very safe and secure city, it is important for every participant to use the public transport system with due care, especially night services.





5.4 Accreditation Procedure

The purpose of the accreditation is to define the roles, rights and responsibilities of the participants in the European Universities Volleyball Championship and to provide them the necessary rights and access to carry out their tasks.


5.4.1 Accreditation center

The Accreditation Center for all participants (athletes, officials, referees and volunteers) will be located on the accommodation site (1118 Budapest, Dayka Gábor str 4.). Opening hours of the accreditation center are 8:00-23:00, which may be changed by the OC in the light of the travel plans submitted by the delegations.

5.4.2 Accreditation procedure

The entire delegation (athletes and officials) is accredited by the designated team leader at the Accreditation Center. Only 1 person per team is allowed to step in the Accreditation Center!

During the accreditation process, each delegation has to go through the following steps:



5.4.3 Required documents

Please prepare and collect all the necessary documents in advance for fast and smooth accreditation process:

- Identity card or passport
- Printed individual entry form, stamped and signed by the university
- Signed declaration of liability
- Signed accommodation policy
- Payment confirmation (if you have made the payments before arrival but it has not been approved in the registration system)

Please keep in mind that each participant must present the same ID card or passport uploaded to the registration system.



5.4.4 Accreditation card

- The Accreditation Card is an official document issued by the EUSA and OC at the end of the accreditation process to confirm the identity and entitlements of participants.
- The Accreditation Card must be worn by all participants in a clearly visible place and manner, thus facilitating the identification of participants by the security service and efficient and rapid verification of their access rights.
- The Accreditation Card is non-transferable, as each card contains personal data and personalized access rights. In the event of loss of Accreditation Card, the participant must immediately apply for a new card in person at the Accreditation Center, by presenting a valid identity card or passport, at a cost of 50 EUR.
- Every participant will get a personalized Accreditation Card which can be used in the facilities of the event, in the accommodation and catering areas and for using public transport within the specified area.
- The European Universities Volleyball Championship 2025 Accreditation Card remains the property of EUSA during the event and can be withdrawn by an EUSA or OC delegate. By using this card I agree to be filmed, televised, photographed and identified during the EUSA event.

5.5 Accommodation

The comfort of the participants is very important at an international sport event. Luckily the district near the university is rich in possibilities.

The athletes and team officials will be staying at the dormitory of Eötvös Lóránd University. The Kőrösi Csoma Sándor Dormitory is one of the biggest higher education facilities in Hungary. In the triple rooms there is plenty of space for the athletes to have rest and the building has all the comfort they need during the event.

The dormitory has a 0-24 reception, security control and medical assistance. The laundry rooms can be used free of charge for the teams to wash the team gear. Free WiFi connection is also available for the participants. The room keys are stored at the reception, the participants have to pick up and leave the keys every time when they arrive or leave the facility.

The referees and other officials will be the guests of Hotel Charles. The 3-star hotel is at walking distance from the campus and the main competition area also.



6. TECHNICAL INFORMATION

6.1 History

6.1.1 General information

Volleyball holds a prominent position as one of the most widely played and beloved team sports across the globe. The credit for its inception goes to William G. Morgan, a physical education teacher from Massachusetts. The inaugural demonstration of volleyball took place on February 9, 1895, marking the beginning of a sport that would captivate people of all ages and backgrounds. It's common to find students enthusiastically playing the sport, and many city-based volleyball clubs often have strong ties to local universities. The game's straightforward rules, coupled with its fast-paced and dynamic nature, make it accessible and appealing to both players and spectators alike. Its universal availability and relatively low costs make it accessible to people from all walks of life, contributing to its widespread appeal.

The global reach of volleyball was further solidified with the establishment of the International Volleyball Federation (FIVB) in 1947 during a congress held in Paris. This paved the way for the first Men's World Championships in 1949, followed by the Women's World Championships in 1952. In 1964, volleyball achieved another milestone by becoming an official Olympic sport, allowing it to showcase its competitive spirit and athleticism on the world's biggest stage.

6.1.2 Hungarian aspect and prominent representatives

Hungarian volleyball roots date back to a long time ago. Primarily, professionals from neighboring countries, especially from Poland, introduced the sport firsthand, which started spreading first in schools in the 1940's, and later through departments.

The Hungarian Volleyball Federation was founded in 1946. The women's national team won a silver medal at the European Championship in 1975. Additionally, they have won the bronze medal three times at the European Championships. Their best placements at the Olympic Games were fourth place achieved in 1976 and 1980. The men's national team won a bronze medal at the European Championship in 1950 and finished second in the continental tournament in 1963. Their best placement at the Olympic Games was sixth place in 1964. The best result at the World Championships was fifth place, achieved in 1952.



6.1.3 Local references

In the spring of 2011, the club earned promotion to the top division by winning University of Physical Education SC, the team reached a highly commendable the Hungarian Cup, and closed this remarkable chapter of success by claiming 6th place in the 2014/15 league season.

The women's volleyball team continued to compete among Hungary's elite for several more years, but following the establishment of the Extraliga (the top-tier league featuring only eight teams), the club was unable to secure promotion PE teacher and volleyball specialist who earned her degree at the Hungarian University of Sports Science and was the first to obtain a doctoral title with a volleyball-focused dissertation at the institution.

close to promotion to the Extraliga on three occasions - finishing second in the league in 2021, 2022, and 2023. Their long-awaited breakthrough came in May 2024. After placing second in the NB I regular season, the team defeated the then went on to clinch the championship title on home court with a 2-0 sweep in the best-of-three final against Vasas SC. This victory secured the team's right to compete in the Extraliga in the 2024/25 season; however, TFSE ultimately de-

promotion from the city league in 2019, the team advanced from NB II to NB I within two seasons. By autumn 2023, the NB I was merged into the Extraliga, allowing the men's team to compete at the highest level, where they finished the 2023/24 season in 10th place – relying largely on TF students. In the following season (2024/25), the women's team successfully defended their NB I title and





6.2 Rules and Regulations

INTERNATIONAL REGULATIONS

The organization of the EUG Volleyball shall be mainly based on the most recent Technical Regulations of the International Volleyball Federation (FIVB) and the European Volleyball Confederation (CEV).

COMPETITIONS

Team Tournaments:

- 1 (one) men's tournament, maximum of 14 (fourteen) teams,
- 1 (one) women's tournament, maximum of 16 (sixteen) teams.

PROGRAM

The competitions consist of 7 (seven) days. The General Technical Meeting, where the presence of each head of the delegation is obligatory, will be held 1 (one) day prior to the start of the competition.

DELEGATION

The delegation will consist of minimum 10 (ten) and maximum 14 (fourteen) athletes and minimum of 1 (one) and maximum of 5 (five) officials. A team composed by 14 (fourteen) athletes has to appoint 2 (two) libero, a team composed of 13 (thirteen) athletes has to appoint minimum 1 (one) libero, a team composed of 10 (ten), 11 (eleven) or 12 (twelve) athletes is allowed to appoint up to 2 (two) libero but doesn't have to play with libero. The head of the delegation and coach must be appointed.

REFEREES

The delegation shall include a referee with at least the highest national license; a relevant license of the National Volleyball Federation must be within the Quantitative entry deadline. Delegations failing to fulfil this obligation must pay 1.000 EUR to the Organizing Committee. Accommodation and food for the referee must be provided by the OC without charging the participation fee; no refereeing fee is provided. OC shall provide 2 (two) sets of polo shirts per referee; referees shall bring their own long dark colour trousers.

DRAW, SEEDING

Draw procedure will be held in front of the team representatives during the GTM, in line with the competition system (format). Its details will be explained to the GTM audience. The draw procedure cannot be repeated, unless a mistake is made, and this is approved by the EUSA TD and SCAC Representative. The results of the draw will be delivered to participating teams immediately after the GTM.

The draw will be done in the presence of EUSA representatives taking into account EUSA Volleyball ranking. The University team of the hosting city, or in their absence, the hosting country's highest ranked team will be placed in first (1) place in pool A. Teams from the same country shall, whenever possible, be placed in different pools.

FINANCIAL OBLIGATIONS

In order to participate, all financial obligations towards EUSA and the Organizing Committee need to be settled by the specified dates, as per EUSA Rules and Regulations.

UNIFORMS

Each team is required to have at least 2 (two) different sets of uniforms, one with main colour light and the other with main color dark. Uniform consists of a jersey (shirt), short, training suit, and must be the same for the whole team. The libero has to wear the same uniform in a different and contrasting colour and must be numbered. Player equipment (accessories) consists of shoes, knee-guards, ankle supporters and elbow protections. Sleeves for legs and arms have to be in the main colour of the shirt in accordance with FIVB Event Regulations.

The competitor equipment and uniforms must follow the CEU 1, CEU 2 and CEU 3 of the EUSA Rules and Regulations. All letters and numbers on the player uniforms must be in contrasting colours to the part of the uniform where they are placed. Numbers have to be placed on the front and back side of jerseys in accordance with FIVB Event Regulations, and must range from 1 (one) to 99 (ninety-nine). During the entire duration of the EUG competition each player must wear the same number. The competition uniforms' colours and players numbers must be presented to the CC, according to REG 90.1 of the EUSA Rules and Regulations.
